



Pucklechurch update

General update

Over the past few months, there have been a series of **dwelling burglaries** in Boyd Valley area, rural areas being mostly targeted, in which high value items have been taken. The enquiries have been carried out by the Investigations Department who have identified three suspects in relation to this and have been arrested.

We do understand the impact a burglary can cause to the individual and the wider community, therefore we want to highlight the importance of making sure that your home is secured. Make sure all doors and windows are locked when you're away, install outdoor lighting, install security alarms, if possible. Residents are encouraged to report any suspicious behaviour or activity that takes place in your area. Together, we can stop the crime before it happens.

There have been several reports of **rogue traders** that are calling on doors without any sort of appointment and offer to do work in the home and/or garden. The work is usually over-priced and of poor quality. They will invent problems or quote high prices for small bits of work. Their appearance can be smart, casual or they might even wear tabards and have fake identification. Most of the time, no paperwork will be given.

Residents are advised not to answer the door, if unsure and no visitors are expected. If they do not leave, you can call us on 999. If a visitor is expected, it's advised to ask and check their ID.

Vans (mostly Ford Transit) are still targeted across the Avon and Somerset force wide area, holes are drilled on the side panel doors, and offenders are easily stealing the contents; the alarms of the vehicle are not usually triggered in this process.

On a similar note, remember to secure your vehicles at all times, even if you might be in a rush, make sure you remove any valuable contents from inside, especially over night.

If you have been a victim of **fraud**, or you know someone that might have been, it's very important that this is being reported to Action Fraud, the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and cybercrime. Anyone can report and it can be done on their website or over the phone on 0300 123 2040.

If you witness any **suspicious behaviour** related to rural crime (poaching, lamping) please do report that as soon as possible. If the incident is in progress, please call 999 and try to provide as much detail as possible, use WHAT 3 WORDS if you can. If the incident had already taken place, this is a non-emergency and can be reported via our online website or through 101.

Walk and Talk

Avon and Somerset have launched an initiative to help combat violence against women and girls (VAWG) called Walk and Talk.

This is open to females aged 18 and above who wish to share their worries or concerns regarding their safety in the local area, they can do this by meeting with a female police officer and/or PCSO to show them those specific areas where they feel unsafe in the community.

This is an opportunity to raise any worries or concerns over your safety in your local area so the police, along with partner agencies, can see what they can do to improve women's safety on our streets.



WALK AND TALK

Come and show us areas where you feel vulnerable or unsafe in your neighbourhood.

Our Walk and Talks are open to women aged 18 and above who wish to share their worries or concerns regarding their safety in their local community with a female police officer or PCSO.


Street Safe

StreetSafe is a service that allows you to report safety concerns in the public places without providing your details.

This includes issues like poorly lit streets, abandoned buildings, vandalism, as well as instances where you feel unsafe due to someone following or verbally abusing you.

Please note, StreetSafe is not for reporting crimes or emergencies.


If you witness a crime or emergency, please call the police on 101 or report a crime online. If you are unsure whether something is a crime or not, read our advice.

If there is a public place where you have felt unsafe, tell us where and why.

Anonymously flag areas on a map where you don't feel safe.



Whether it's due to environmental reasons, such as poor street-lighting or anti social behaviour or harassment, reports to the app are shared with your local police force and local authorities for action.

Fam Watch/ Horse Watch

Rural crimes can be reduced by the use of Watch schemes, which are a free service for the farming community and police to share information and help reduce opportunities for crime. Using your knowledge and awareness of what is happening on and around your land, you can help reduce crime and deter criminals.

The aims of the schemes are to reduce the local opportunities for rural crime; to reinforce the community spirit so that everyone can contribute towards the protection of their property by mutual co-operation and communication. It is also important to improve the intelligence flow between the agricultural communities and the police.

Police alert members via text, email or landline voicemail to suspicious incidents and crimes occurring in their area. In return, members are encouraged to remain vigilant and report suspicious activity promptly.

Members will be able to contact the Rural crime team directly with information and intelligence about any suspicious incidents or potential criminal activity in the area.
