



M4 Junction 18a News: YOUR COMMUNITY NEEDS YOU!

Pucklechurch Parish Council believes that our parish is facing one of the biggest challenges to its continued existence: if enacted, the option to create a new motorway junction and associated link road here will have potentially devastating and irreversible consequences for both the local landscape and our community.

This newsletter has been produced by the Parish Council to provide information about the proposal and the ways in which you can make your views known.

All residents are urged to take part in the public consultation.

Background

A feasibility study into the creation of a new motorway junction on the M4 (18a) and the route of an associated link road to the A4174 Ring Road has resulted in two options being put forward for consultation.

One of these options, the Eastern Option - would involve the construction of a new motorway junction at the Westerleigh Rd. bridge and a road through our parish. Two possible routes for the road – Eastern Option A and Eastern Option B - have been marked on the map.

The independent study was commissioned by South Gloucestershire Council and Highways England. The aim of the new junction would be to tackle congestion problems in the north-east fringe of Bristol and help businesses operate more efficiently. Funding for the study was secured from the Department of Transport after a campaign led by Chris Skidmore MP that made the case for a new junction in Emersons Green that would serve the Bristol & Bath Science Park and the community at Lyde Green.



Opposition to the Eastern Option

On 5th July PPC unanimously resolved to oppose the option for the construction of a new link road through the parish and for junction 18A to be sited at Westerleigh Rd.

On 14th July Chris Skidmore MP and Luke Hall MP, as well as more than 100 residents, attended a public protest meeting at which the MPs pledged to oppose the Pucklechurch option. Chris Skidmore went so far as to say that he would remove support for Junction 18a if the Pucklechurch option remained on the table.

A whole parish issue with consequences for all areas of settlement

Pucklechurch Parish Council has pledged that it will do all that it can to ensure that residents are able to make their voices heard and to feel that their contribution to the consultation process has the capacity to make a real difference. The Council acts on behalf of the whole community and whilst acknowledging there are specific issues affecting the residents of particular areas it will make no distinction in fighting harder for one area over another.

Parish Council view

The Council position is that the Eastern Option does not deliver the outcomes the cross-party campaign fought for: there would be irreversible consequences for the Bristol/Bath Green Belt and potentially devastating consequences for our community identity, multiple designated heritage assets, our industrial and archaeological heritage, the conservation area, the character of the local landscape (including the setting of the Cotswolds AONB) and its biodiversity, as well as residential amenity, traffic and air quality. Our primary aim at this stage is to demonstrate the Eastern Options are not an option.

Councillors have also been meeting with representatives of other parish councils with a view to impressing upon them that this is more than a Pucklechurch Parish issue: one likely consequence of the Eastern Option would be the creation of new rat runs and traffic congestion over a much wider rural and regional road network (induced traffic).



Housing development

There is much speculation about how building a road through the parish might lead to future housing development but there is no evidence to support this as a driver for building the road here. The Council is aware that a number of speculative development proposals were produced as the result of the local plan-making process. PPC would like to reiterate that NONE of these sites has been approved but they have been offered by private developers whose concept documents will always present a convincing case in their own favour whilst playing down the constraints. Pucklechurch and its surrounding area has not been identified for strategic housing growth as it is not considered compatible with the spatial strategy.

Your view

There are a number of reasons you might oppose the Pucklechurch option.

It also possible that you may object to the construction of any junction at all.

You might object for one or all of the reasons suggested below and may have others:

- Loss of Green Belt and harm the local landscape
- Increase in traffic and congestion on local roads
- Damage to conservation areas, heritage sites and listed buildings
- Harm to protected wildlife, valuable natural habitats, woodland etc.
- Spoil the setting and views from the Cotswolds AONB
- Increase air pollution and carbon emissions
- Harm to residential amenity, health and well-being
- Loss of community identity because of potential for housing development
- Threaten public transport provision by encouraging more car travel
- Isolate areas of the community from one another
- Make it dangerous for people to access local facilities by walking or cycling
- Damage local trade/employment by taking business away from the local area
- Fail to reduce congestion and meet business needs at Emersons Green
- Create new traffic hot spots and no upgrades to the A4174 roundabouts
- Divert the spending of public money from more pressing needs

Public Consultation: how to make your views known

This is the first stage in overall scheme development. If the scheme progresses, it would still require detailed design, evaluation, preparation of business cases and statutory permissions: there would be more public consultation over several years.

The outcome of this consultation will be published in March 2018.

It is vitally important that as many people respond to the consultation as possible. There are three ways to register an opinion - you might want to pursue all of them:
