## **Chair's Report Autumn 2021**

#### **Meetings**

As some of you may recall the ability for parish councils to meet and legally take decisions online came to an end in May 2021. This was because government still needs to bring new primary legislation forward in order for this to happen. In the interim parish council agreed that our Clerk was enabled to make decisions on its behalf in accordance with its published scheme of delegation. Since July 21, 2021, however, Council has been arranging to meet in person, and full council meetings are now scheduled to take place at Pucklechurch Primary School on the 3rd Wednesday of every month. School was chosen as a venue as it has the space to enable meetings to take place whilst still following covid health and safety guidance. Any exceptions to this are published on our website. In addition to this we have also agreed to continue to meet online on the 1st Wednesday of the month. These online meetings are not full council meetings in the sense that decisions cannot be taken at them, but they are instead advisory working meetings and in the interest of transparency will still be held publicly albeit online and of course residents are welcome to attend. Parish council has had to act in a dynamic way in order to ensure its business is transacted as efficiently as possible whilst adhering to legislative requirements. Our first (and indeed our second) 'inperson meeting at school was held outside in the fresh air since a risk assessment was made due to the increase in infection rates across the district at that time whilst noting advice from South Gloucestershire Council's Director of Public Health. As the weather changes and the nights draw in it is unlikely that we will be able to continue to do this should the need arise!

#### **Burial Ground: maintenance, safety, and regula**tions

Parish council has a duty to arrange memorial safety testing to ensure the continued safety of visitors to the burial ground as well as any of its contractors that work there. Our Area Assessment and Memorial report (July 2021) has been published on our website and work undertaken to do this has shown there are a number of memorials that are at risk of becoming unstable and one at risk of toppling.

Contrary to general public assumption, ownership and the maintenance of memorials remains the responsibility of the family of the deceased, so this means PPC will always try to trace them to take action to resolve issues that have been identified. If no one comes forward, or they cannot be traced then it is possible in some instances that stones will have to be laid flat if they are deemed to pose a risk of injury to those visiting the burial ground. Clearly PPC does not want to cause distress to families by doing this without notice or consultation and so in the first instance temporary measures will be taken to stop memorials falling over.

Information was also gathered to inform a schedule of maintenance works that PPC will be undertaking to improve the area and also to ensure that it is able to carry out its duty to preserve biodiversity through a sensitive management programme. The burial ground is also subject to Pucklechurch Burial Board Cemetery Regulations which unfortunately in some cases do not appear to be being adhered to. Please remember that, for example, no planting on graves or cremation plots is permitted since many plants, due to the depth of their roots, may prevent the future reopening of the grave. Other items, such as plastic objects, ornaments, wind chimes, windmills, flags, lights, candles, any kind of fencing or anything made of glass are also not permitted.

#### Trees, trees and more trees

PPC owns and is responsible for a large number of trees that are surveyed on an annual basis by a specialist company for signs of disease etc. As a result of the most recent survey, we have commissioned a number of works that will be undertaken over the coming months to resolve issues that have been identified as requiring attention. Sadly, this includes the felling of

one tree which will be replaced. We have, however, also received a request from SGC to promote a scheme to plant trees in Pucklechurch residential gardens and also to consider encouraging the community to form a Friends of Pucklechurch green spaces group or similar. SGC has access to up to 300 trees donated by the Forest of Avon which will be available to residents to plant in their private gardens. The maximum is one per garden to the value of £20.00. It is likely that the scheme will offer trees either through an on-line voucher scheme which can used at any nursery/garden centre and through a one-day event in December at the Community Centre where residents can simply choose and collect a tree. The project can be managed by the parish council although the preferred option would be for a small group of residents who are interested in promoting environmental measures to come together to enable this to happen. Could that be you?? Please contact our Clerk if you are interested.

It has also come to our attention that the Trading Estate has new owners. In light of all the recent development and disruption, PPC has agreed to try to work with SGC to approach the new owners to undertake tree planting to both screen and enhance biodiversity around the village side of the perimeter of the estate.

And finally, we have decided to take up an offer from The Honourable Company of Gloucestershire to provide two English Oak trees in celebration of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022. One of these will replace the tree which needs to be felled at St Aldams and the other located somewhere on Oaktree Avenue, subject to agreement with South Gloucestershire Council.

- If you are over 18, a UK, qualifying commonwealth or citizen of the EU and have lived in, been registered to vote, worked or owned property in Pucklechurch parish for at least 12 months.
- Councillors declare acceptance of public office and observe an ethical code of conduct when acting on behalf of the council.

You simply need to bring integrity and a common-sense approach and be willing to look for viable and pragmatic solutions. Full training is available.

## GIRL GUIDING IN PUCKLECHURCH



The 1st Pucklechurch Guides have been enjoying a return to face to face meetings since lockdown restrictions continue to be lifted. We made the most of the nice weather exploring the village with a quiz and planting sunflowers which we will be taking to our allotment to see which Guide can cultivate the tallest bloom. We took part in an obstacle course on the rec which showed some impressive athletic skill, and some

great cheerleading, encouraging everyone who took part.

After studying ordnance survey maps we walked from Parkfield down the steep sided valley to discover how contour lines drawn closely together indicate steep hills and valleys. After stopping for a nourishing snack (of course!) we returned via the Old Railway Line. In preparation for camp, the girls spent another evening learning to pitch tents.

This last term we had the pleasure of welcoming a real detective to one of our meetings. She helped us investigate a staged crime scene and the Guides (and the leaders) enjoyed learning how to collect evidence from a crime scene using actual police equipment and also taking fingerprints. As well as being an amazing oppor-

tunity this activity also helped the Guides complete their investigation badge. The girls were really inspired by the session and I think we may have a few budding detectives in our unit!

We have also been focusing on the history of Guides and have beenlearning about how Girl Guiding started and grew. The girls were shocked that they would have been expected to stay at home while their brothers' were out exploring the world. Whilst we may be glad that the uniform changed since 1910, we have enjoyed learning about the women and girls who set in motion the tradition which we are part of today. Learning about the history of Guiding has also helped prepare some of the newer Guides for taking their promise in the near future.

We have lots of adventures to look forward to in the near future, including a division camp being organised for September, and would welcome any girls aged 10-14 who want to be part of the fun and friendly unit. We meet Tuesday evenings in term time 18:45-20:15 - with most sessions beginning and ending in the scout hut next to the community centre.
