
PUCKLECHURCH PLAYERS CELEBRATE A DRAMATIC 40 YEARS!

In 1981 an ad was placed in the Pucklechurch News inviting villagers to an inaugural meeting to ascertain interest in forming a drama group. As a result of that meeting, Pucklechurch Players was formed. The first production in October 1982 was two one act comedies, 'Henry Hereafter' and 'Today of all Days'. A mini pantomime 'Snow White' was performed the same year at the PCA Christmas Concert. Our first full length pantomime 'Rumpelstiltskin' was performed in January 1984.

Forty years on and the Group has gone from strength to strength with performances twice a year, one of which is a pantomime every other year. In total, we have performed approximately 100 full length plays, one act plays and pantomimes. Some of the original members still live locally and even help out during our productions. Over the coming months, we hope to post some pictures of our past productions on our Facebook page where you will see some old and familiar faces.

We would like to thank all of you that come and support our endeavours, year in, year out and hope we will continue entertaining you for many years to come.

Finally, we look forward to seeing you at our November production of 'Murdered to Death' by Peter Gordon.`

Three Shires Patient Participation Group

The Three Shires Surgeries (covering Pucklechurch, Wick, Marshfield and Colerne) have a Patient participant group that meets approximately four times a year. The focus during the last two years has been helping patients and surgeries cope during the pandemic. The group was also the instigator of a smaller group that has organised the Memory café for people in the area living with dementia and their carers.

At our AGM in July, one question that came up from several members was about plans regarding appointments. Following the reply from Doctor Prince we asked him if he would write an article for local publications. This he has done.

We are aware that the current telephone triage-based situation is far from ideal for a lot of people, and there is a strong desire to 'get back to normal.' I think the first thing to say is that we dislike it as much as, if not more, than the patients do. None of us went to medical or nursing school to end up feeling like we are working at a call centre. We also worry about what we may be missing over the phone and end up calling a lot of folks in for a face-to-face appointment which makes everything more inefficient. Coupled with that, General Practice across the UK has had some of its busiest months on record since January, with several months seeing double the consultations of previous records. Suffice to say we will be getting 'back to normal' as soon as safely possible. Our main obstacle is of course the ongoing and currently very high numbers of Covid 19 cases in the community. We must continue providing an ongoing service for very vulnerable patients who need pre-chemotherapy bloods for example. The thought of them being in waiting rooms full of patients (who have come to see us about this strange cough they have had) is the stuff of nightmares. We also have a duty of care to our staff. With four or five clinicians working from a small building the footfall can be very high. We have given considerable thought as to how it could be done safely, but we are stuck with the status-quo for now. We currently have many staff off sick with Covid and are very aware that it is making it very difficult to provide the service we would ideally like to give. Over the next couple of months, we will be welcoming two new practitioners and a new doctor to the practice and are very much hoping the pressure on appointments will ease. I am often asked about Nurse Practitioners so thought I would give a brief explanation. The job title is misleading; whilst many of them initially trained as nurses, the role they fulfil as a NP is far closer to that of a doctor than it is to a nurse. They are trained to take a medical history, examine patients, and can prescribe, refer on to hospital and often book x-rays. We never ask them to work unsupported by doctors and are always happy to give advice or review a patient when they need it. They can take a massive burden off the doctors allowing us to see the more complex or sicker patients and we would very much encourage people to try them.

Again, a big thanks to the vast majority for their ongoing understanding. Please remember our receptionists, who often take the brunt of frustrations caused by a situation entirely out of their hands. Here is hoping for better times in the next few months.

Pucklechurch Parish Council – Chair's Report Autumn 2022

Play areas update

As those of you who live in the area will know, works to upgrade the Eagle Crescent play area are well underway and I am pleased to report, that as of the time of writing, they are due to be completed on time. We have been made aware by the contractors of all the kindnesses offered to them by residents with regard to refreshments they were provided with during the heat wave - thank you to everyone who showed them what a caring community we have! Council will be organising a proper opening event as soon as everything has bedded down - keep an eye on our website and Facebook page for details. In the meantime, SGC will be producing a short video profiling the work that has happened and what it has taken for parish council to get it to this stage. Sadly, however, we have had to remove some of the timber pieces at St. Aldam's Drive as they are coming to the end of their life, and this has been hastened by dry ground conditions exacerbated by the recent hot weather. Council is also aware that the slides appear to have suffered deliberate damage. Options for upgrading and replacing pieces there and in our other areas are starting to be explored.

What a joy it was to have been able to see how many people sowed the seeds we provided. Thank you to everyone who` shared photographs with us via Facebook – we have posted a short slideshow of some of these, and more pictures will be added soon. Since this initiative proved to be so successful, we have started to put our thinking caps on as to how we might continue to do this in some form again next year. **Bus Services**

I expect many of you are aware of the issues surrounding the continued funding of the Y5 bus service and its potential withdrawal by Firstbus from October when the government's Covid funding ends. This is because bus operators must assess the viability of all routes once this funding ends in the autumn. I must emphasise that no decisions have been made and that I, along with several other residents, made the strength of our feelings known at a public meeting convened by WECA Mayor Dan Norris in Yate on August 1st. The meeting was well-attended and reported on widely in the press, and on the BBC website, as the result of contact being made with a reporter from the Local Democracy Reporting service. Since the meeting was called at short notice, I was not there to represent council views, but you should know that parish council has been raising the issue of our poor bus service at every opportunity. We are in a catch 22 situation - the poorer the bus service, the less likely it is to encourage people to use it, but conversely the less we use it the more likely it is to be cut. As I write this report, the government has announced an extra £130m of funding which will support services for an additional six months, so let's hope some of this will be used to support the Y5.

Help with the rising costs of living

South Gloucestershire Council has a range of grants to help if you are of state pension age and struggling financially and can help you access national support for the rising cost of living. The Household Support Fund is available until the end of September so we want to help as many people to access this as we can before then. And finally.....

If you go down to the Pucklechurch woodland today, you might be in for a surprise - there is growth and vibrancy everywhere now as a result of the clearing work we commissioned. The paths are well laid and settling, and woodland plants are moving in to replace where the ground ivy was. The trees have responded well to thinning and are currently in full leaf and there were orchids earlier in the year – a little bit of Pucklechurch paradise to explore just over the motorway bridge!
