the formal regulatory process. The latter will involve a 6-week public consultation before it can move to independent examination. Our thanks to all the volunteers that have given their time to help us get to this stage.

Sports pitches and drainage improvements. Council has been putting together a project to access the remaining s106 funding arising from the Oaktree Avenue development that is ring-fenced towards providing/improving sports facilities. Expert advice on the plaving surfaces of both the football and cricket pitches and drainage issues relative to waterlogging will be addressed by a programme of works that will improve the Recreation Ground for everyone.

Play Areas. A new accessible roundabout has replaced the old one at the Recreation Ground (at a cost of £17,500 +VAT) after SGC agreed to allow us to use s106 money. Also, after much searching, new chains have been sourced to repair the swings. Our working group talked with residents at Revel about what we might use our earmarked funds (£45k) to provide. In addition to this we have recently identified a source of independent grant-funding (up to £50k) that we can apply to for replacement/new pieces, although it is not a foregone conclusion that we will be successful. If anyone would like to sponsor or fundraise specifically to enable the provision of additional new items, we would love to hear from them.

Finally, I want to say something about PPC's request to remove picnic benches that appeared on the Recreation Ground as this caused a degree of adverse comment via social media. PPC welcomes proposals from residents and businesses who want to provide equipment/facilities for whole community benefit, but we must take a wide range of considerations into account before agreeing to anything being installed on public land that we own. We are not killjoys. In this instance a huge range of questions needed to be raised, involving ownership, insurance, positioning, health & safety, ongoing maintenance, cleaning,

Marilyn Palmer writes Additional Local Plan Consultation

From 19th July to 13th September South Glos Council is carrying out 8 weeks of additional Regulation 18 Consultation on "the Council's strategy for ensuring the adequacy of its own housing land supply and whether it can assist Bristol City Council's unmet housing need". 17 further sites have come forward which could potentially accommodate 1751 houses. 8 are brownfield sites (815 houses). One site is in Boyd Valley which is the Cemex site near the quarry in Wick for 45 houses. However, even with these additional sites, the Council will not have a 10% buffer that is required to ensure supply, let alone have additional supply to help meet Bristol CC's unmet needs.

Therefore, the Council's position is that it is not able to address Bristol CC's unmet needs, either wholly or in part. To accommodate the housing numbers required in the period up to 2040, the plan includes the release of some Green Belt. Hello Revellers REVEL

Let's discuss 2024, quite possibly one of the busiest days we had seen at Revel for many a year. There was a wonderful selection of stalls from local groups, organisations mixing with charity stalls both local and national scattered with some business stalls. The Fair made a reappearance and so did the food vans. Children and adults enjoyed Chloe's Mobile Farm as well as the children's entertainment. The Guides had a winning success with their version of the Hungry Caterpillar. The day was a resounding success and the weather held out to be a lovely June day.

Unfortunately, despite all the excellent effort from volunteers, sponsors and the new family night, the same could not be said for the Beer Festival. The weather did not help, with thunder and lightning on the Friday night many ticket holders stayed away, the same when the rain interrupted our evening performance on Revel day.

The beer festival is one of our most expensive outlays however in the same breath can also be one of our most lucrative money makers. Fortunately, Revel can rely on volunteers who rent the plant, mats and fencing which saves so much money. However, the marguee, portable toilets, security and insurance is around £6k due to many of our vendors increasing their costs this year.

Unfortunately, Revel did not make enough

money this year and fell short of breaking even by around £1500. Although Revel is still a viable event, we need to make some cost cutting ventures in order to continue the tradition of Revel which saw its 73rd year in 2024. This year our costs for Revel this year totalled: £15,485 and we only received an income of £14,062 this left us in a deficit of £1,423.

This year has been a strange one because of monetary challenges beyond the control of Revel, to future proof Revel for the coming years, there is a need to make some changes for 2025. So, potential changes are afoot, I can't detail them at present as they haven't been agreed by all plotters Mike & Sue who post footparties yet.

It also means that until we can confirm what is happening with Revel we are unable to provide grants this year. This will be a huge blow to all the groups and organisations that rely heavily on the money that Revel are able to donate each year.

The AGM is scheduled for September 19th, 2024, at 7pm in the Pucklechurch Village Sports and Social Club which is open to all groups and individuals where we can detail this year's accounts as well as elect new members with bright ideas so that can save the longstanding Pucklechurch Tradition.

PUCKLECHURCH **ALLOTMENTS** Where are they, what are they and do I need one?

Hi, I'm Phil Owens Chair of Pucklechurch Allotment Association. We thought you may like to know a little about the allotments and what goes on. The allotments are located on the right just over the M4 bridge heading towards the Crematorium. Plots are rented from the parish council and cost £20/year. There are currently 30 allotment gardens of varving sizes which has increased provision and helped accommodate those with less time to garden.

Our allotments lack services; no power, water or toilet facilities but mobile solar panels and a spare car battery can provide sufficient power for most small-scale applications. Likewise, water is managed by collecting from sheds and greenhouse roofs, with many plots having 1000litre tanks. Overall site maintenance is carried out by plot holders and last season we improved the access track. As an Association, we joined the National Allotment Society and a small fee is levied on all plot holders to cover Society membership which provides access to low cost insurance, seeds as well as free advice. It also tops up our coffers for improvement work at the site. Fund raising including a stall at Revel 2024 with stocks and games and support from Revel Committee and the parish council means we have sufficient funds to purchase a composting toilet which will be installed soon, legs crossed!

Over winter, the wet weather was challenging resulting in soggy cold ground and a slow start to the growing season. With warmer weather, crops are now flourishing along of course with the weeds. Thanks to age from security cameras on our WhatsApp group chat, we regularly see the wildlife looking to enjoy our crops including raiding deer. Luckily our nesting Buzzards and newly arrived Red Kite are also interested in the predators. We're a sociable bunch, and whether you are an experienced grower or beginner, there is always someone willing to offer advice or engage in some healthy competitive growing. 

HMP Ashfield were extremely pleased that Serco were awarded the new Contract in April 2024, following a period of re-bid. As of the 31st October one contract will end and the new contract will start as of the 1st November 2024, with a number of innovations to bring HMP Ashfield up to date.

One of the key elements will be Sustainability, ensuring we are well aligned with the Governments Sustainability plan, we have appointed a Sustainability & Social Values Manager, who will drive forward these plans. Some of the criteria for the Residential units will change also, for example an Enabling Environment being introduced for those prisoners less able than others.

Our Education, Skills and Work in-house will increase with additional skills being identified for the prisoners needs, along with an increase in our Psychological Services, so that programmes can continue and be increased.

There will also be engagement with a number of partnership agencies to enhance the services currently offered at HMP Ashfield, along with this our Community links will continue.

As you may be aware, recently a Team of Serco Leaders from across the Business units attended the Scout Hut in Pucklechurch, to refresh the decoration and upgrade some of the furniture, we wish to continue to have a good working relationship with our Community.

HMP Ashfield will be hosting a Recruitment Open day on Wednesday, 7th August 2024, between 15.00 hrs – 20.00 hrs, due to a number of increases in positions across the site.
