Pucklechurch Parish Council Chairman's Report

There are two items of parish council business that I would like to bring to your attention in this edition of Puckle-church News, one being the precept and the other being our agreed response to the South Gloucestershire Council Local Plan Phase 3 Consultation.

Precept and our budget

The largest proportion of income that enables Parish Council to fund its services is collected by South Gloucestershire Council via the Council Tax process. We begin our budget setting process in November each year so that we can agree the amount of money it requires to operate in the following financial year – this is called the 'precept. The amount you pay relates to your tax band and is shown on your Council Tax bill. Our agreed budget is published on the website under the 'Your Council' (Accounts) tab. The Precept calculations for 2024/25 are as follows:

Precept agreed 23/24 £96,896.00


Draft precept 2024/25 £121,896.05

Increase for 2024/25 £25,000

Increase from previous year (£101.61) £27.38

Increase per week £0.53.

This diagram shows, in simple terms how the budget expenditure breaks down: it can also be viewed on our website. Please note that while these are budget headlines, there are crossovers, for example, reserves will include an amount being set aside for playground refurbishment.



South Gloucestershire Council Local Plan Phase 3 Consultation

There is much detailed and time-consuming work Parish Council undertakes on behalf of residents behind the scenes, not least of which is acquitting its responsibility as a statutory consultee in the planning process. Council also responds to multiple SGC consultations every year. As some of you will be aware, SGC is developing a new Local Plan for South Gloucestershire, which will include a new strategy and policies to manage development and change in our area over at least the next 15 years. Parish Council has produced and published a detailed response to the latest stage of consultation, which can be read in full on our website.



Councillors attended briefings, delivered leaflets to publicise SGC meetings, attended events in Shortwood and Pucklechurch and gathered data on residents' experiences - they also, read many technical papers and over 800 pages of consultation documentation and spent numerous hours formulating the response. To her great credit, and with our grateful thanks, our Clerk, Daphne Dunning worked tirelessly to ensure that our views were drafted, expertly expressed and evidence based with as much data as possible. We are told that what was being suggested had not been finalised, but it remains to be seen whether our comments will bring about material change to the plan.

South Gloucestershire News from Councillor Marilyn Palmer

Thank you to everyone who took the opportunity to attend the SGC Local Plan consultation session and submit comments. Officers will now analyse the feedback and adjustments will be made before the next stage. It is a long process which involves going through an Examination in Public with Government Inspectors, so it is not likely to be adopted before the end of 2025 at the earliest.

Progress has been made with the transfer of land needed to complete the Shortwood Road shared path. The intention is to start the main work sometime in the spring and it will be necessary to carry out some advance works to clear the remaining section of hedging so that the work can proceed without interfering with nesting birds.

Whilst progress is being made and the 'missing link' will be completed, however, concerns were expressed about clearing the remaining section of hedging. Some clearance is necessary, but the removal of the hedgerow did upset and shock a number of residents. The removal of the hedge was not something that was done lightly. To have left the hedge as it was and to provide the path with another boundary would have taken a lot more land. There were also concerns about security if the

path was hidden from view of the road with no surveillance. Surveys of the hedges showed the hedge which had the greatest historic value is the hedge that runs north-south between the crop field and the horse paddock, rather than the one that has been replaced.

It was a reluctant decision to remove the hedge, but the new hedge line has a greater variety of trees and plants which will provide and support a greater range of wild-life and biodiversity. Concern was also expressed that some horse riders feel unsafe riding on the path because drivers don't slow down if the horses aren't being ridden on the road. Horses are unpredictable and can easily be spooked by fast or noisy vehicles passing by, so please be mindful of this. I am told that in terms of the horse riders (and maybe cyclists) not using the path, the new path does not prevent them from using the carriageway, but rather gives them a choice. The new path

provides for less confident cyclists and walkers by giving them a safer route, and of course gives local residents a connection that wasn't t here before. I have also asked that before the new path is completed, t old cycle path next to the prison is tidied up and signage improved.





GIRL GUIDING IN PUCKLECHURCH

In December we went to the cinema to see 'Wish'. Odeon and Girlguiding arrange special showings for members only. Our year ended with a lively Christmas party.

Five new Guides joined in January. We began with First Aid, although some of you may not have enjoyed being carried on stretchers made from coats and broom handles! All survived and returned the following week to make zip wires for teddies to fly down – this was great fun. During other weeks a variety of balls were thrown, rolled or caught to find out which shape best suited the activity. Another activity consisted of creating 'works of art' which included two innovative puppet shows performed by girls crouching in the kitchen with only the puppets showing through the open hatch. Very ingenious.

Special mention to our Senior Patrol who took up a baking challenge and left the kitchen spotless afterwards. They also examined how binary codes are made up and discovered there are eight digits for every letter or number, making a manual code very long.

Finally, which patrol could build the tallest, structurally safe tower from junk? Amazingly the Polar Bears, (with limited design techniques and much Sellotape!), managed a free standing tower which practically touched the ceiling. Puffins had lots of solid struts and also managed a free standing tower. Foxes made their own version of 'Operation' and managed to extract various 'organs' with an ingenious long handled 'spoon' made of clothes pegs.
