South Gloucestershire News from Councillor Marilyn Palmer

Fleur de Lys - Deteriorating state of a building in a Conservation Area

The Fleur is such an iconic building in the centre of the village Conservation Area, but it is looking very run down. Planning Enforcement have investigated the deteriorating state of the Fleur. I was advised that "there is an extant planning permission (P22/02688/F) in place specifically for the former public house, this relates to: "Partial change of use of public house, to 2no. dwellings, to include parking and associated works".

"Attached to the consent, there are conditions which require the heritage of the building to be respected (for example) condition 5 which references the public house signage, the gates and access points to the micropub being

retained. This permission is currently being built out. Therefore, the council cannot, at this stage in the ongoing development, take any action." I will be keeping a close eye on the development to ensure that the conditions are adhered to.

South Glos Council Local Plan – the next stages

I thought it would be helpful to explain what is happening following the consultation on the Emerging Local Plan. The officers are currently studying the responses and also external changes since the consultation was issued before Christmas. They will draw up a report for Cabinet with recommendations for the Draft Local Plan which will then have to be approved by full Council.

At that stage there will be a further six-week public consultation on the Draft Local Plan. There will also be a sustainability appraisal report. The exact timing of these next phases may be affected by the General Election. The response to the consultation will be considered, and if no modification or only minor modifications are accepted then it will be forwarded on to the National Planning Inspectors.

The Planning Inspectors will hold an Examination in Public where people can make their views known to the Inspectors either in person or in writing. The Inspectors will either approve the Plan, suggest minor modifications, or reject it. If rejected, then the Council will have to produce another Draft which will need to go through consultation and Examination in Public again.

Once the Local Plan has been approved by the Planning Inspectors it will become the policy of the Council. All future planning applications will be judged by the Local Plan. There is a timeline on the Council website, but realistically it is unlikely to be adopted before the end of 2025.

News from the Patient Participation Group (PPG)

You may be aware of the dire warnings coming from the Three Shires Medical Practice about the precarious financial state of General Practice, and rural practices in particular.

I am hoping by the time you read this, the situation will not have worsened, as at a meeting last month we were reassured that there are no plans to imminently close any of our surgeries, but that this would have to be considered if the government do not wake up and improve the funding.

Three Shires is in a difficult position because it is just one practice (attracting one set of NHS funding), but is running four sites. Thus it is funding four buildings, with all the maintenance and energy bills, and four sets of staff. Added to which, the area covered is huge, from Colerne to Pucklechurch – but there are only 9,700 patients. Whereas Kingswood Health Centre, which recently hit the news with their financial difficulties, services 15,000 patients from one site, with a compact practice area.

Rural practice, therefore, has its own difficulties and challenges, but there is no financial recognition of such. The partners are very grateful to those of you who wrote to their MP with this problem, and we, the PPG, are working hard to lobby opposition candidates, Parish councillors, Healthwatch, local councillors and anyone else we can think of!

You can help by being loyal to the Practice – do not get lured by on-line pharmacies or Royal Mail to ordering your medicines from them. The Practice needs the income from dispensing your prescriptions, otherwise they really will go under. Similarly, go to the Practice for your jabs, not local pharmacies.

Anti-social behaviour - report it!

As many of you will no doubt have heard, a spate of vandalism in and around St Aldam's Play Area and Oaktree Avenue left us with rubbish strewn all over the grass, a litter bin destroyed and the wooden platform for the slides smashed to pieces. In addition, several car wing mirrors were also broken in what can only be described as a mindless and selfish spree of destruction. The cost of repairs to the slide and bin amounted to about £2500 alone. In addition to this there have been reports of drunken noisy anti-social behaviour until the early hours of the morning going on for several nights on the Rec and much broken glass by the Oak tree. Anti-social behaviour (ASB) is any activity which causes harm, harassment, or distress to an individual or a community. It is imperative that all incidents of anti-social behaviour are reported to the police as this is the only way we can guarantee a police presence to counteract the activity itself. The more it is reported the better it's easy to do and its confidential. In addition, a community trigger is a tool for tackling anti-social behaviour as part of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, but in order for a community trigger to be activated it must meet one of the following criteria:

3 incidents of anti-social behaviour or hate in a 6-month period have been reported.
5 reported incidents of anti-social behaviour or hate in a 6-month period involving a linked location reported by more than one person.
