Pucklechurch Parish Council: Chairs Report Winter 2023

Parish Council is facing several challenges, not least of which are the conversations we are having around the setting of our budget for activity over the next 12 months, but also the next 3-4 years. What Council wants to try and achieve, what our fixed costs are, and what is possible financially and legally are not easy considerations to balance, especially as we are mindful of the current economic climate and the squeeze on household expenses. We also have a big piece of work to do to access and then use funds that were generated for the provision of sporting facilities as a result of the development of Oaktree Avenue. Then there are the improvements to our play areas, dealing with the consequences of Ash die back in our woodlands, and the completion of the Neighbourhood Plan. Alongside all of this I would like to draw you attention to:

Community Centre - PCA needs you.

Some of you may already be aware that several members of Pucklechurch Community Association committee will be stepping down from their role as trustees at the PCA AGM in spring. The village came together to build the community centre and for many years the PCA has successfully operated it. Without new committee members coming forward, PCA is likely to be dissolved and in September parish council issued an open letter explaining the consequences of this - you can read the full text of that letter on our website or on our Facebook page. In short, if the PCA ceases to exist, it is not possible for Parish Council to just take over responsibility for the operation of the centre. If there is no PCA to operate and manage the centre, it will have to be closed until such time as an alternative solution can be found. Parish council has no budget or staff resource to run the centre and would have to ensure best-value solutions can be found, one consequence being potentially significant increases in hire charges to cover the management costs of a new external leaseholder. So, I am asking for you to consider coming forward to be a PCA trustee and committee member, as I am sure you will agree we would be all the poorer without the centre being available to us and it needs to be managed for local people by local people.

South Gloucestershire Draft Local Plan

By the time you read this SGC will have launched its consultation on the next phase of the Local Plan and will be seeking views on its new strategy and planning policies, as well as areas allocated for potential development. At the time of writing the full documentation was not available to view but all indications are that there are several areas of our parish that have been identified for growth, and in particular along the ring road, impacting Shortwood and land to the north of Lyde Green. Messaging from SGC is that no decisions have been made at this stage, and that comments will be sought that could change what is eventually decided. Please be assured that Parish Council will be responding to the consultation in forensic detail, and I would encourage ALL residents to respond to the consultation too. We will do our best to communicate how to do this, what the issues are and provide help wherever possible. SGC will be arranging a public meeting in Pucklechurch in January - please make sure you keep up to date with what is happening and when by following our Facebook page as well as checking our website and noticeboards.

Finally – not only have we have acquired new solar powered-lights for the Christmas tree as part of our drive to be more environmentally friendly, but we will be producing a parish wide climate change and nature action plan in the New Year that we will encourage all residents to become involved in. Let's hope 2024 brings something for us all to be joyful for - Season's Greetings from all at PPC.

Abson Road currently has a speed limit of 40mph. This high speed limit makes it dangerous for smaller animals like cats to cross the road safely. According to a study by the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association, reducing traffic speeds can significantly decrease the risk of fatal accidents involving pets (JAVMA, 2012).

We believe that lowering the speed limit from 40mph to 30mph will make Abson Road safer for all residents - both human and feline. By making this change, we can prevent further tragedies from occurring in our community.

SGC Report by Cllr Marilyn Palmer **Boyd Valley Ward**

Speeding through the villages of Boyd Valley continues to be the issue that I raise most often with South Gloucestershire Council and the Police. The Police have carried out speed tests on different roads in the village but they will only do these in 30mph zones. Surprisingly, they concluded that we did not meet the criteria for introducing Speedwatch. They have assured me that they will be doing further speed checks in the near

South Gloucestershire Local Plan. South Gloucestershire Council will soon start a nine-week consultation about where new homes are to go between now and 2040. The formal documents, with the maps and proposals in detail will be published on 4th December, with public meetings in January so villagers will be able to put their questions to officials. There will be a meeting at Pucklechurch Community Centre on 22nd January 2024 between 3.30pm - 6.30pm and another at Mangotsfield Football Club on 17th January 2024 between 4pm -7pm.

The Council has to allocate sites for 9,463 homes across South Gloucestershire, and they have searched for Brownfield sites (land previously used but now available for

Urban infill and market town sites; Sites not in the Green Belt. They have maxed out all of these, but that still leaves 5,740 to find.

As a last resort the Council is consulting on alternatives including some Green Belt housing, mainly adjacent to the Ring Road. The sites put forward will go some way to meeting the Green Belt objective of preventing coalescence of communities so that villages and communities will keep their character and identity, but they would impact on Shortwood.

The Local Plan also proposes around 50 - 80 homes in those villages which have facilities such as a school, GP surgery and shops including Wick, Marshfield and Pucklechurch where 60 houses are proposed. An Abson road site is the most likely, but the council really wants your views, and can be flexible about the plan and the best

Rainbows


