Revel 2019 has already kicked off and the committee and its merry band of volunteers are hot on the heels of last year's success to continually make our Revel, BIGGER and BETTER.

One of the events we are aiming to improve is the annual Bob Stone award. Some of you may be wondering what this award is and who was Bob Stone?

Bob Stone lived in Pucklechurch with his wife Elaine and children Carrie and Tim for many years. He was active along with his wife in many community groups, including the Revel committee and was often seen on the other side of the camera documenting each Revel and its many events. After his untimely death in 2005, it was decided to honour his memory with an award to the individual or organisation that makes the biggest contribution to Revel each year, past winners have been:

Previous Awards: 2005 Bob Todd; 2006 Alan Holder; 2007 Mike Hanks; 2008 Women's Institute; 2009 Martin Smith; 2010 Derek Watts; 2011 Dave Sargent; 2012 Andy Smith; 2013 Elaine Stone; 2014 Mandi Smith; 2015 Lori-Anne Button; 2016 Pucklechurch Beer and Cider Festival; 2017 George Wynter.

In 2017, the Revel committee discussed with Elaine Stone plans to slightly change the award and make it entirely community based with any member of community to be eligible for the award.

The brief is short, sweet and brief. "Do you know someone who goes the extra mile to make this community a better place? Perhaps they welcome new neighbours, volunteer to help neighbours in distress or work tirelessly in service to the entire neighbourhood and/or community organization. How about someone who tries to make sure everyone in the community feels included? Or somebody who shows up to lend a hand at every community meeting, fundraiser, or community clean-up and neighbourhood meeting?"

This year we had many nominations but there could only be one winner....

- Tony Wallace, who has been running the Explorers in Pucklechurch for nearly 20 years;
- Gail Boyle, who has, and still is, working tirelessly on the 'Say No to Junction 18A' campaign;
- Dave Sargent who, every year, gives up his valuable time to put up advertising for Revel and make the Parade float for the Revel Royal Family;
- Su Gunningham-Reid for her work on both the Revel and Beer festival and taking on the, quite often, thankless task of treasurer;
- Myself, Lori-Anne Button, for the work I do for Revel;
- Lynn Bate

However, it was the last nominee who shone out from the start and who received a staggering nine nominations. This, I think, is the most nominations we have had for one person in over five years!

Looking at the nominations and what this nominee did for our community, it's a wonder they had not been nominated before.

She was involved in many things throughout the village, helping and volunteering for the NSPCC and was often seen out with a collection bucket at the supermarkets and NSPPC fundraisers, as well as carol singing to raise much needed funds for a worthwhile cause.

She was also an old hat at beer festivals too, often selling tickets at the ticket booth, along with myself as a slightly tipsy teen and asking, "haven't you had enough yet, Lori?". The answer was, and still is, "no, never!".

She was well known for her catering skills, baking many delicious goodies for various events and groups, from the Golden Jubilee to Café De Pringy, which was a delightful fixture on each Revel day.

She was a committee member with Gardeners Club for a number of years, being Chairperson for the last 3 years, only stepping down in May due to ill health. She would volunteer to prepare buffets for Gardeners Club, Twinning and for other occasions, asking nothing for her time.

Her enthusiasm and commitment was infectious, with her often involving me in much of the work - although that had the benefit that I was first to taste the goodies!

She will be a very hard act to follow.

It is unfortunate that the award is a posthumous award, but for those who knew her, she didn't do it for the praise or accolades. She did it because she enjoyed it and wanted to help.

It is with a mixture of great pleasure and sadness to award the Bob Stone Community Award 2018 to Lynn Bate. Her husband Greg will accept this on her behalf.

The award is handed out in Bob Stone's name each year and after the many nominations we have seen this year, we would like to see more in the future. We have a village of doers and makers and some of these people often go unnoticed and hide in the wings, like Lynn did. Let's say a big thank you to these people and give them the recognition they deserve. So get thinking and get nominating for the 2019 award.

EXPLORERS

Vulcan Explorers meet in the Scout Hut on Thursday evenings, although we are often away from the hut. A favourite recently was to try the Escape Room in Bath, which we just succeeded in escaping from before time ran out. A few weekends ago we went hillwalking in the Brecon Beacons, staying overnight in a Youth Hostel. 2018 has seen two members complete their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Awards and five have achieved their Chief Scout Platinum Awards.



For the first time, we ventured abroad for our summer camp. We stayed on a camp site near Amsterdam, flying there from Bristol and then using trains to complete the journey (and to travel around the country). We visited the Rijksmuseum and Anne Frank's house in the city as well as going on a canal boat trip. We also visited Arnhem to an open-air museum focusing on the culture associated with the everyday lives of Dutch people, with antique houses, farms and factories from different parts of the Netherlands.

Whilst summer camp was during the hottest part of the summer, with temperatures in the thirties each day, only four weeks later six of the unit completed their Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award Expeditions in a torrential downpour. Their expedition involved canoeing unassisted along the River Thames over three days, from Lechlade to beyond Oxford. Before this, they undertook a training programme on the River Avon and in Bristol Docks, as well as a practice expedition on the River Wye.



In the coming weeks we are playing a Badminton tournament, going on a night hike, and finishing with a ten-pin bowling night, as well as finishing off our DofE awards and planning our camps and activities for 2019. There is also the opportunity to train and take part in the Ten Tors event on Dartmoor next May.

Pucklechurch LED Street Lighting

Introduction

In order to meet national spending targets, as well as reduce carbon footprint under European Legislation, South Gloucestershire Council (SGC) needs to make significant financial savings and reductions in CO2 emissions over the coming years.

Like many local authorities, SGC are introducing LED (Light Emitting Diode) street light technology to help reduce energy costs and cut carbon emissions. SGC will be replacing all 29,500 street lights with LED units between the years 2014 - 2024.

When?

SGC will be replacing the street lighting in Pucklechurch Parish between Apr 2019 and Jun 2019.

What will change?

Light pollution is considerably less - Less light spills into the sky and into gardens, meaning driveways and doors don't get illuminated and Skyglow is reduced.

LED lights use less energy - When implemented; the LED street lighting will reduce SGC's total street lighting energy, and carbon emissions by about 70%.

LED lights reduce maintenance costs — LED units last longer and require less maintenance through their life. LED lights can easily be controlled - This means SGC will be able to dim lights at appropriate times, to help reduce energy costs.

Changes to Lighting Columns -

SGC proposes to use existing lighting column positions where possible. Additional lighting columns may be installed or existing columns may be removed as part of the LED replacement to improve illumination or replace old stock. This will happen prior to LED replacement and neighbouring residents shall be notified.

All LED lanterns installed since Apr 2017 shall be all-night operation.

May cause minor disruption - StreetCare shall be carrying out the work and should only cause minor disruption during the replacements. If you get the chance, please approach the StreetCare operatives with any questions or request a feedback card to submit your experience. Further Information

Pucklechurch Primary School

Pucklechurch CEVC Primary School were delighted with the support of parents, family and friends attending their Remembrance Day Service. After spending time in the classes creating class wreaths to place around the school's cenotaph, they went to the hall where each Hub shared their learning.

Mrs Capel, the interim headteacher said, "As I am sure everyone is aware, it is a particularly special event this year and we ensured the children developed a true understanding of this. We know how important it is for all of us in our community to reflect on these important events. Due to the importance of this, we have spent a long time in school learning about this time, along with finding out about soldiers, from our local area, who gave up their lives for us. We have also taken the time to stop, think and reflect on this period of history - to truly remember. We shall be forever grateful to those who gave up their lives and fought in the war."

Parents commented on how moving the Remembrance assembly was and how sensitive the children were about such an important time in history. Diversity Crew, who led the Remembrance Day service, have talked about why this day is so special to them, "Remembrance day was extremely important to us because the people that went to war gave their lives to us to keep us safe, so in return it is important to remember those poor souls."

Mrs Capel commented, "We are very proud of the respect and compassion our children showed through the passion and effort they put into this assembly from the very smallest children in reception to those in Year 6."

Miss Miller, RE lead at the school, said "The children also made clay poppies which we have laid at the church to enable the school to be part of their service. It is importance for us to show our appreciation as part of the Pucklechurch community."





NEW PATIENT GROUP FOR THREE SHIRES MEDICAL PRACTICE

Earlier this year Three Shires Medical Practice set up a Patient Participation Group (PPG) which meets regularly with GPs and the Practice Manager to take up patient issues and help support and develop Practice services and activities. A group of patients from each Practice surgery site, (Colerne, Marshfield, Pucklechurch and Wick) came together in April to create the new group. The aims of the group, expressed in terms of reference on the Practice website, are to bring forward ideas and suggestions to benefit patients and the Practice. The patient members of the group are all volunteers. They will seek to advise, inform and influence the Practice from a patient perspective, promote health knowledge and develop communication between patients and Practice (the group is not a forum for complaints or personal issues nor is it a doctor's fan club!). The PPG terms of reference and meeting minutes appear on the Practice website under the heading 'Patient Group' and the group intends to meet once a quarter.

The PPG is very aware of the original Patient Reference Group set up in 2015 and is very keen for this group to continue and expand so that patient views can be taken forward by the PPG. If you would like to become part of this growing patient representative group please go on to the Practice website and the heading 'Patient Group' and complete the online sign up form. As a member of the Patient Reference Group we would like to be able to contact you three or four times each year for your opinions and suggestions. For example currently the PPG and the Practice are running a patient survey; please see the survey on the Practice website, Patient Group or collect a survey form from your surgery reception. The results of the survey will guide the work of the PPG in 2019.

The start of a new season with a newly formed bigger club has been a little harder than expected. We began the season with the challenge of fielding two teams - something we thought having merged would become easier. It was disappointing as a club to have to cancel some friendlies as we were unable to field anywhere near 22 players. It would have been helpful to practise as our teams and try and find formations that fitted the new players working together.

We are moving forward with a three-person coaching team now to help get the new squad settled in to their respective divisions

The club came away from the first league away games buzzing with some great results. The 1s, losing 3-1 at half time to great side Westberries, came back fighting to finish with a great 3-3 draw. Good Neighbours Scheme

We were pleased to have received a report from The Good Neighbour Group at a Parish Council meeting and to hear that it is going from strength to strength. They are now approaching their tenth year of helping those in need in the Parish. We are most grateful and I would like to thank them on behalf of the Council and all those that have been in receipt of their support.

Changes to South Gloucestershire Council Planning Process

Changes have been made to the way that SGC manages planning applications that came into effect on Thursday 1 November, 2018. SGC suggests that most people will not notice any big changes, but hopes there will be noticeable improvements in the speediness and consistency of the decisions that are made which will improve the service it provides. Although the committee structure that deals with the decision-making process has changed, no changes have been made to the way that the Parish Council or residents can respond online or in writing. Site visits will however not routinely take place before committee meetings and the visits themselves will now just be for members, with a representative of the parish council and applicant present.
