GOOD NEIGHBOURS

We hope you have been safe and well over these past exceptional months that have seen us all having to change the way we live more than any of us may have thought possible. Despite the very different circumstances, the Good Neighbours have been busy helping people in our Parish as we have over the past 11+ years. You'll recall that we set up a foodbank in early April as a result of the Government lockdown. The aim was to help by giving food packages to families who found themselves in need of a little help due to a variety of reasons such as shielding, self-isolating, being furloughed, being unable to get to the shops, etc.

As the lockdown restrictions were eased, the foodbank closed at the end of July. During its operation, we gave out over 230 food packages to families in Pucklechurch, Shortwood and a family in Wick due to the exceptional circumstances.

We would like to thank everyone who donated food and household items and money to the foodbank. The money was used to buy fresh food and items in high demand.

We would also like to thank Vicky Fyfe for co-ordinating the foodbank, and the foodbank volunteers for making it such a huge success: Carolyn Baker, Jacki Berry, Christine Cope, Elaine and Paul Derrick, Lynne English, Vicky Freestone, David Lewis, Mark Thornton, Lea-Ann Tierney, Debbie Woods and Georgina Wynter. Although at the time of writing, we're in a further lockdown, people are not being told to shield. Therefore we won't be setting up foodbank again. Click and collect services can continue and supermarkets have a lot more delivery slots. NHS and care workers, elderly and vulnerable customers are also being given priority access at Sainsbury's and Tesco.

As well as foodbank, we've continued to help people in the village by picking up prescriptions, shopping and providing telephone company. We also did some small gardening tasks over the

Pucklechurch Parish Council: Chairs Report Winter 2020

In some ways this year seems to have disappeared very quickly, but in others I'm sure that many of us will feel, for one reason or another that it has dragged on. In the depths of winter, it is easy to lose sight of the positives in life. However, one of those positives over the last nine months is how our community has pulled together in all kinds of ways in the face of adversity. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each one of you for the parts you have played, big or small, in making our community a special place irrespective of the challenges we have faced. We can only hope that 2021 will bring good news and happiness to everyone.

New Councillors

Those of you who have read Pucklechurch News regularly will know that Parish Council has been operating with about half the number of its full complement of councillors over the last few years, with only five individuals standing for election in May 2019 and one resignation since then. Nevertheless, after reaching out to residents via social media several people came forward with a view to being co-opted to Council and as a result, we are now back up to a total of 8 councillors with just one vacancy remaining. I am pleased therefore to say welcome to our new councillors who are Andy Hemmings, Martin Hayman, Nathan Anscombe and Lee Alford. Trees, Meadows & Path

Under the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006, Pucklechurch Parish Council has a duty to conserve biodiversity. In this respect Council has committed to working with SGC to deliver projects that make a positive contribution to improvements to green infrastructure and promotion of nature recovery including sustainable management of, and the creation of, new natural habitats. Councillors met with SGC StreetCare and identified three areas that can be managed so as to contribute to the 'Space for Nature' project, which includes creating a wildflower meadow at the Barrage Balloon site and wild areas of well-managed roadside verge as well as 'Buglife B-Lines' around Pucklechurch ('insect pathways' running through the countryside and towns linking wildlife areas). Residents should be aware however that it takes time for wildflower meadows to be established and the sites may look untidy or bare for some time - a strict regime is required and whilst waiting for the results will require a lot of patience, Council is sure it will be worth it. SGC has also identified several pieces of land in its ownership where new trees can be planted and will begin to do this over the next few weeks. We already live in a green space, but it will be getting greener, as will the opportunity to cycle, walk and ride to and from the village in a safer way as planning permission has now been granted for SGC to complete the unfinished path adjacent to Shortwood Road.

Crime

Parish Council is aware of concerns raised by residents over an increase in the number of crimes and anti-social behaviour incidents across the parish. Council requested a crime report from Avon & Somerset Police but was provided with inadequate data on the measures taken and the progress made to address identified crime. As a result, it resolved to raise these concerns with the Chief Constable

and the Avon and Somerset Police and Crime Commissioner. Avon and Somerset Police is responsible for law and order and Pucklechurch Parish Council has extremely limited powers for crime prevention. Nevertheless, a working group was formed to consider potential crime prevention measures, and these were discussed by Council in November. Some residents had asked for CCTV provision to be considered but this is not something that can be delivered by Parish Council for several reasons. CCTV provision would more usually be the responsibility of the local authority, with significant installation and ongoing management costs, for example, just three cameras to be installed in Downend, to a pre-existing system were recently projected to cost £30,000 with ongoing monitoring costs of £10, 000 per year. Pucklechurch Parish Council also does not have the power to implement a CCTV system on land it does not own, or the staff resource to manage the GDPR implications nor adherence to the Surveillance Camera Code of Practice and other government guidelines. The working group did identify several actions the Council might take in terms of promoting community resilience and assisting with both crime reporting and crime prevention and this is an ongoing project. It is nevertheless vital that residents report ALL instances of crime and anti-social behaviour to the neighbourhood policing team to ensure that resources are directed to dealing with the issues we are experiencing.
