# Pucklechurch Parish Council: Chairs Report Winter 2022

It's hard to believe that 2022 is nearly over and although this year has seen improvements on the Covid front there are still many challenges to be faced, not least of which is the current cost of living crisis. Parish Council is doing what it can to publicise support measures on its website, as well as via social media, and it's worth noting a few here:

The West of England Rural Network community oil buying scheme.

Local and financial support measures for South Gloucestershire.

Green Community Travel.

### **Parish Council Community Grants**

The application window for our community grant scheme is now open – the closing date for applications is 27 January 2023. The aim of this scheme is to support and promote an active community in Pucklechurch. It provides small grants for new organisations as well as grants to existing organisations for work or projects that will be of benefit to residents. N.B the applicant organisation must be based in the Parish of Pucklechurch. The total amount of money any one group may be awarded is limited to the amount set aside by the Council for this purpose, which is £4000.00 for 2022/23. Parish Council expects, however that the amount requested by community groups will collectively exceed the amount available and so will use its discretion to make decisions on how best to apportion funds to achieve the most beneficial outcomes. ### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Considerable inroads had been made into the delivery of this project prior to the pandemic but sadly until recently all progress had stalled. The original company we commissioned to facilitate the development of the plan had produced an initial draft but are no longer able to support us in its completion. We have now commissioned a new consultant (from Andrea Pellagram Ltd.)

# **Buses for Shortwood**

Sue Hillier from Shortwood has been in touch to ask for some help regarding the bus service that ran from Pucklechurch to Shortwood. Sue says: "Before the demise of the Y5, I took a petition around Shortwood which every household signed. Villagers were encouraged to email their concerns to Luke Hall MP, Dan Norris the West of England Mayor and the Managing Director of First Bus. This they did."

"On 4 November there was a Surgery at Shortwood Methodist Chapel to which villagers were invited to attend, along with Luke Hall and Steve Reed, a transport counsellor. The Managing Director of First Bus also walked through the village."

"I would love the residents of Shortwood and Puckle-

to review the work done to date and to create an action plan to take us forward. We have also made an application for a Neighbourhood Planning Grant and increased the number of clerical hours available to us to support the administrative work the project involves.

### **Oaktree Avenue replacement fence**

Some of you may have noticed the new fencing that has been installed along Oaktree Avenue. The original fence was somewhat dilapidated and had become overgrown with brambles and was a dumping ground for litter. Parish Council approached SERCO with a view to resolving concerns that had been raised by residents over the state of the fence. The company's positive response has resulted in the whole area being cleared and a new fence being installed. Parish Council would like to thank SERCO for their efforts and the expense they went to in resolving the issue.

### Full Council - new members, new projects

I am very pleased to report that we no longer have any vacancies on Council as we have co-opted two additional councillors – this brings us to a full complement of nine councillors. Many of you will already know Dean Freestone through his work with Pucklechurch Cricket Club and you may also recognise Jayne Hawkins as someone who has previously served as a parish councillor. Welcome to them both. They arrive just in time to help us set out our ambitions for the coming year, which will likely involve looking at how best to re-invigorate the other parish play areas and the provision of 'sporting facilities' using the remaining s106 monies. We are also currently in the middle of setting our budget requirement for 2023/4, in the process of drawing up a new maintenance contract to go out to tender and progressing the neighbourhood plan....so there's plenty to keep everyone busy!

By the time you read this, Christmas festivities are likely to be well under way, so it befalls to me to extend seasonal greetings to you all on behalf of Parish Council and all good wishes for 2023.

Steps are then taken to ensure the safety of the person you care for.

### **1st Pucklechurch Guides**

During the Autumn term the unit welcomed six new girls making a total of 24 Guides, divided into four patrols, all named after endangered species – Pandas, Polar Bears, Puffins and Penguins. We're working on 'I'm a Survivor – Guide me out of here', a fun badge with many different clauses. Patrols have tackled 'Lily Pad leap' (successfully crossing an imaginary pond without falling in), captured other patrols' flags outside in the dark, built mini rafts, bracelet making and a gory 'worms in the dirt' with ingredients supplied by leader Maggie.

Guide programme activities have included going on a penny hike in near darkness, which resulted in ending up in the pumpkin field! Another activity challenged patrols to find out which glues or tapes worked best when trying to stem leaks in plastic bottles. To familiarise new Guides, and reinforce all with our six laws, patrols acted out ways of breaking them, quite realistically and definitely noisily, but thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Quieter times have been spent selecting patrols and agreeing our Unit Guidelines, which all signed, and which are displayed on our noticeboard. Girlguiding teamed up with Children in Need and held a Sewathon where girls sewed, or learned to sew, badges on their camp blankets – a useful skill for life. Another evening was spent learning the art of decoupage, resulting in an impressive array of pretty gift boxes.

We joined with Scouting members for the Remem-

brance Parade and Service, and all helped raise funds for the Poppy Appeal through the sale of coffee and cakes after the service.

Our Christmas tree for the church festival displayed our hand-made clay decorations. One night we recycled plastic and other materials into a magnificent Beast. At the beginning of December we have a cinema trip to Bath to view Matilda at a special screening just for Girlguiding. Then we'll end with a party on 13 December.

A special mention to Young Leader Izzy, and Guide Liv, who attended the county Camptastic in September and declared it a wonderful experience.
